Essay questions

Essay # 1 The Role of the Responsorial Psalm in the Liturgy of the Word

1. Select a specific Sunday in Ordinary Time (for example, the 17th Sunday, Year B).

Prayerfully reflect on the texts of the first reading, the gospel reading, and the psalm, exploring the connections between and among these texts.

a) How is the responsorial psalm related to the first reading?

b) How is it related to the gospel reading?

c) What is the responsorial psalm doing?

--How is the psalm our response to the word God is speaking to us in the first reading? To the word Christ is speaking to us in the gospel proclamation?

– **Who is the responsorial psalm calling us, the Church, to be on this particular Sunday of the liturgical year?**

2. Write a 1 ½ -2 ½ page essay summarizing and sharing the above reflections. What new insights have you gained? What do these insights confirm for you? What challenges do they raise for you?

3. ***Important:*** At the beginning or end of your essay, list at least 4 resources you used from the list given below. (Other comparable resources may be substituted as long as STL and the GIRM are included.) Additionally, please cite the reference within the text of the essay where applicable. **Here are two examples of a citation within the text:**

This psalm is an example of a psalm of confidence, with emphasis that God can and will protect the faithful (Nowell, 1997).

According to St. Augustine, singing is for the one who loves (STL, 2). (Note: STL stands for *Sing to the Lord.*)

Essay #2 The Ministry and the Spirituality of the Psalmist

1. Applying the insights you gained from reflecting on the role of the responsorial psalm

a) reflect on the role of the psalmist in singing the responsorial psalm. Beyond singing words, what is the psalmist really doing? How can you as psalmist best prepare yourself to fulfill this ministry?

b) reflect on the spirituality of the psalmist. **Who is the psalm calling you, the psalmist, to be on this particular Sunday of the liturgical year? Who is the psalm calling you to**

be in your daily living this week?

2. Write a 1 ½ -2 ½ page essay sharing your reflections. What new insights have you gained? What do these insights confirm for you? What challenges do they raise for you?
3. As noted above, at the beginning or end of each essay, list at least 4 supplementary resources you used from the list given below. (Other comparable resources may be substituted as long as STL and the GIRM are included.) Additionally, please cite the references within the text of the essay where applicable. See above examples of a citation within the text.

Note: Although the Lectionary and the Bible contain the actual text of the readings and the Psalms and serve as the core of the work of the cantor, they are not considered “supplementary” resources. The supplementary resources are readings which describe and interpret the Scriptures and/or their role in the liturgy, and/or which describe the role of the cantor in proclaiming the Word.
