Greetings, NPM!

It is our pleasure to welcome you to the Heart of America for the 47th Annual Convention. Everything is certainly "up to date" in the City of Fountains: Kansas City. This year's convention, "Fountains of Faith," will be held at the Sheraton Kansas City Hotel at Crown Center, which is also home to Sea Life Kansas City Aquarium, LEGOLAND®, Kaleidoscope, and the Hallmark Visitors Center.

Pre-convention events begin with a much-anticipated handbell institute (including a concert), Directors of Music Ministries retreat and an organ crawl that will feature some of the finest pipe organs in the midwest. This year's convention will also include a clergy retreat, taking place on Tuesday of the convention. Our Tuesday evening concert will be one for the history books, as we experience the magnificence of the Kauffman Center for the Performing Arts, followed by an evening of beer and hymns at Johnnie's Jazz Bar and Grill, located inside the iconic Mainstreet Theatre. Concerts throughout the week will be hosted at two beautiful cathedrals just blocks from the convention center: the Catholic Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception and Grace and Holy Trinity Episcopal Cathedral.

Getting around the convention and the city has never been easier. It's just a short walk through the LINK-an indoor covered pedestrian walkway—to Union Station. Kansas City offers a FREE streetcar that runs from 6:00 am to midnight. Beginning at Union Station, the streetcar stops along Main Street at the Power and Light District to the historic River Market and back. Dining at this convention will be extremely convenient. Food options are endless, with five restaurants located inside Crown Center and over 50 restaurants along the streetcar route!

After three days of engaging and inspiring plenums, breakouts, concerts, and showcases, the culmination of our convention will be the celebration of the Eucharist at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, often referred to as the "Gold Dome Cathedral."

On behalf of our Core Committee and our Programming Forum, we look forward to welcoming you to Kansas City!



Plenum 1

The Liturgical **Act and Song**

Rev. R. Bruce Cinquegrani, DMin

The great liturgical scholar, Romano Guardini, uncovered a key dynamic underlying any liturgical celebration. He called it simply, "The Liturgical Act." This talk will explore Guardini's concept of the liturgical act as essential to full, conscious, and active participation, especially as it applies to song in the liturgy and the critical role of human empathy in this process.



Rev. R. Bruce Cinquegrani, DMin is a priest of the Diocese of Memphis (ordained in 1979) and currently serves as the parochial vicar of Saint Louis Parish in Memphis, Tennessee. He is the former Director of the diocesan Office of Worship (1986-1992, 1996-2010) and has served as

the Director of Vocations and Seminarians, as well as pastor of several parishes in the Memphis area. He is a visiting assistant professor of Catholic studies and a chaplain in Campus Ministry at Christian Brothers University in Memphis.

He holds a BA in Religious Studies from Assumption College (Worcester, Massachusetts), an MDiv from Saint Meinrad School of Theology; Graduate studies in Counseling and Psychology from the University of Mississippi (Oxford); an MA in Liturgical Theology from the University of Notre Dame (South Bend); and a DMin in Liturgical and Sacramental Theology from Barry University (Miami).

Plenum 3

Precious Memories

Three Fountains of Catholic Faith -Father Clarence Joseph River; Sr. Thea Bowman, FSPA; and Mr. Leon Roberts

Each person introduced in this presentation was an intentional creation by our God for the express purpose of their genius for the sake of the Church. Father Clarence Joseph Rivers, Jr. (Selma, AL); Sr. Thea Bowman, FSPA (Yazoo City, MS); Mr. Leon C. Roberts (Coatesville, PA.)

None were cradle Catholics but all imbued with a spiritual fervor whose power transformed the scope of liturgy, music and spirituality for the good of all people. Their skills flowed from a well so deep that all people around them were compelled to take notice. Their spiritual power could not be held back and lavishly gushed forth from a full fountain of tremendous holy gifts.

Through the wisdomed lens of the song, "Precious Memories" by J. B. F. Wright (1925), we explore their shared faith and contributions to the Catholic Church. First written in hymnic fashion, the piece was embraced and received into the improvisatory bosom of the traditional Black Church. The lives of Rivers. Bowman and Roberts are refracted through the text of the song's refrain.




Rawn Harbor has enjoyed various liturgical and musical ministries in the Church since 1972. He earned a BA in Music from Furman University in his hometown of Greenville, South Carolina, and a Master of Theological Studies with an emphasis in Liturgy from The Franciscan School of Theology in Berkeley, California.

Among his many and varied activities in the Church, he has served as Director of the first gospel choir since 1972 in the Archdiocese of Washington, D.C. (St Benedict the Moor); Director of the Office for Worship in Wichita, Kansas; Pastoral Associate, liturgical musician and liturgist at Saint Columba Catholic Church, Oakland, California; adjunct instructor at The Franciscan School of Theology; and director of music and liturgy and instructor in the Performing Arts Department of the University of San Francisco. Rawn is a composer of Psalms from the Soul (OCP), sacramental music and psalms for both Lutheran synods, and psalms for the Episcopal Church, as well as a composer and artist with GIA Publications, Inc., in Chicago, Illinois.

Semi-retired and now residing in Maryland, he is presently working on another collection of psalms for the Church year, acclamations for the Mass, and other projects. Never one to sit still for too long, he now serves as liturgy/music director for Our Lady of Perpetual Help in southeast D.C. and director of music and liturgy for Whitefriars Hall (O'Carm) in Washington, D.C. An effort is now underway to set more musical pieces to paper.

Kansas City Barbecue Sauce

Ingredients:

- 4 oz can crushed tomatoes 1 Tbsp salt
- 1 cup ketchup
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- ½ cup apple cider vinegar
- ½ cup molasses
- 1 Tbsp smoked paprika

- 2 tsp ground black pepper
- 1 tsp chili powder
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tsp onion powder
- ½ tsp red pepper flakes
- 1/2 tsp ground mustard

Directions:

Combine all ingredients in a medium saucepan and bring to a boil over medium heat. Use a whisk to combine and mix the ingredients while it comes to a boil.

Once your sauce is boiling, reduce the heat to low and allow it to simmer for 20 minutes. The sauce should thicken nicely, and your house will be filled with the sweet aroma of delicious BBO sauce.

Remove the sauce from the heat and allow it to cool completely. It can be used immediately and keeps in the refrigerator for up to two weeks.
